Using AAC to encourage communication for Pirate Topic

The Lesson Plan







Objective: To encourage joint attention, social interaction and expressive communication.

Resources Required:

AAC devices, Big-Mack, communication boards

Pirate-themed book and printed pictures of key elements. (Am I a Pirate? Sensory Story)

Pirate costume accessories (optional)

Tactile Treasure map

Pirate-themed games such as "Walk the Plank" or "Pirate Bingo"

Pirate-themed snacks (optional)

Starter Activity - Joint attention I.e Attention Autism (10 minutes):

Greet the pupils using preferred method i.e high five, hello on device.

Show pictures or videos of pirates. Recall prior learning

Use AAC devices or communication boards to discuss pirate-related vocabulary such as ship, captain, treasure, and parrot.

Activity 1: Pirate Story Time (20 minutes):

Read a pirate-themed book to the class using AAC devices or communication boards to help students follow along.

Allow plenty of processing time provide ways for pre-verbal pupils to answer i.e show symbol. Mimic noises I.e Arrrrr!

Use AAC devices or communication boards to reinforce new vocabulary and concepts from the story.

Activity 2: Pirate Games (20 minutes):

Set up a treasure map with clues and challenges for the students to follow using AAC devices or communication boards to guide them.

Play pirate-themed games such as "Walk the Plank" or "Pirate Bingo" using AAC devices or communication boards to communicate the rules and instructions.

Pop-Up Pirate with a peer or teaching assistant.

Plenary (Yes I am old-school):

Recap the pirate-related vocabulary and concepts learned in the lesson. If taking photos during sensory story display on board.

Provide pirate-themed snacks (optional) and encourage students to dress up in pirate costume accessories again or limited demand play with resources
