What is Childhood Disintegrative Disorder (CDD)?

Also known as Heller's syndrome, CDD is a rare condition where a child has a period of normal development, followed by a significant loss of previously acquired skills before the age of 10.

- Affects approximately 1 in 100,000 children.
- More common in males.
- The exact cause remains unknown, but neurological factors are believed to play a role.



The Landscape of Regression: Recognizing the Signs

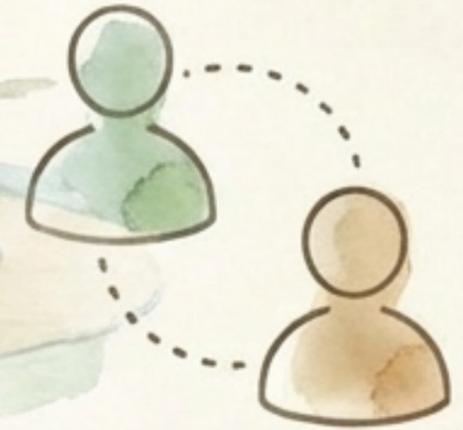
CDD is characterized by the loss of skills in key areas of development. This can include:



Communication: Losing the ability to learn and recall words.



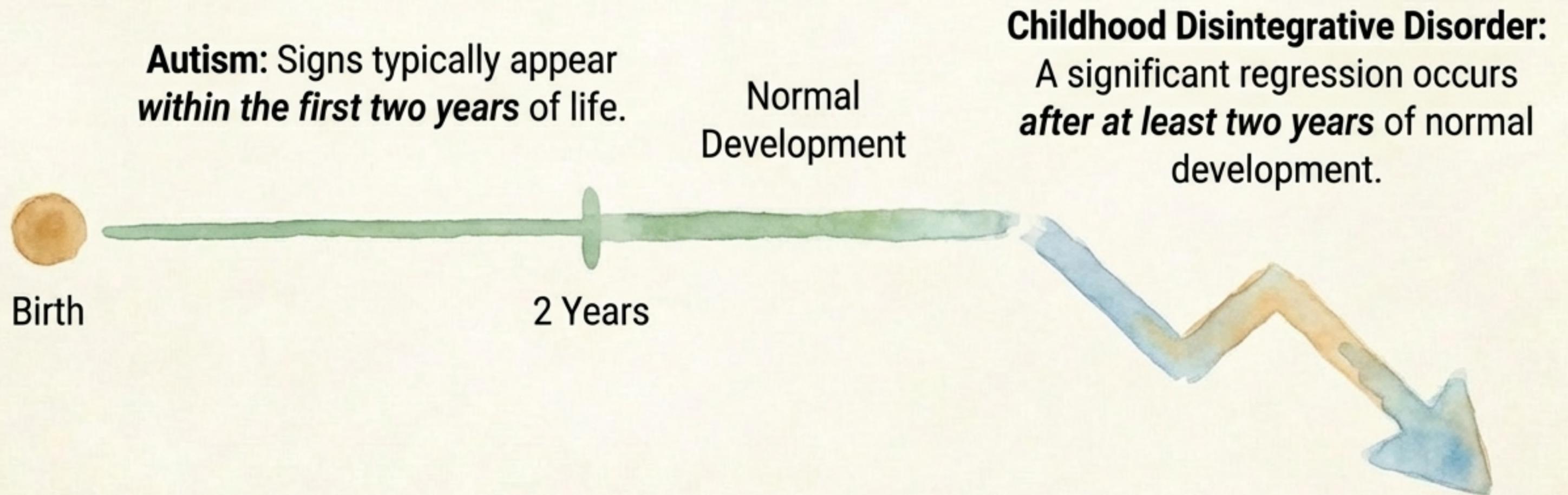
Self-Care: Regressing in tasks like feeding oneself, using the toilet, washing, or brushing teeth.



Social & Motor Skills: A noticeable decline in social functioning, play, and motor coordination.

A Key Distinction: CDD vs. Autism

While both involve challenges in communication and social skills, the primary difference is the timing of onset.



The Path Ahead: Prognosis and Possibilities



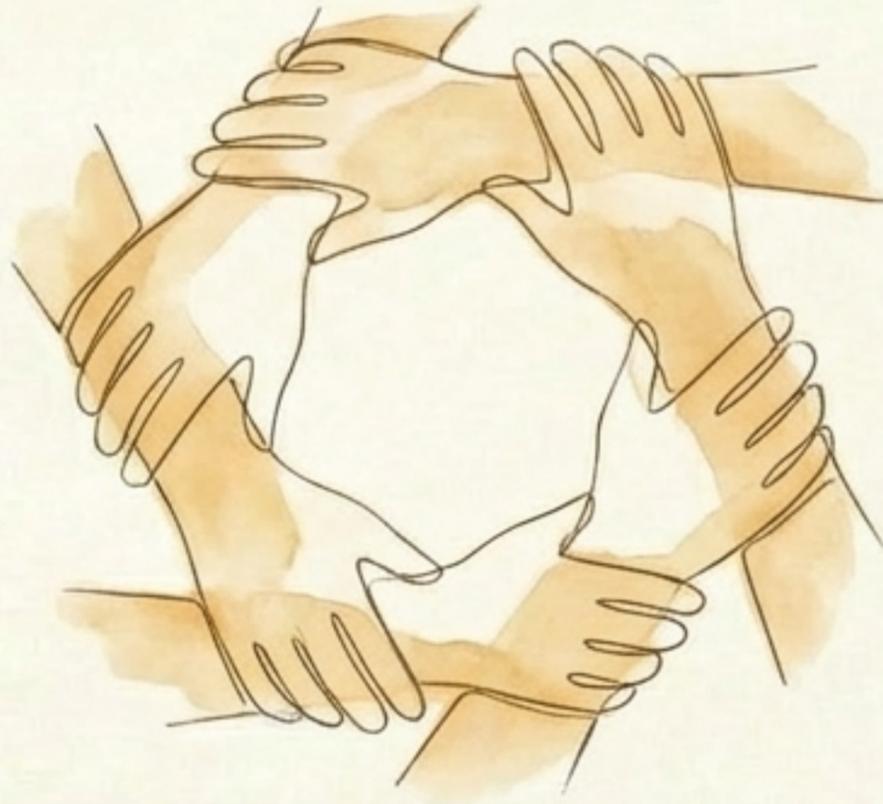
The long-term prognosis for CDD is variable and many children will require lifelong support. However, this is not the entire story.

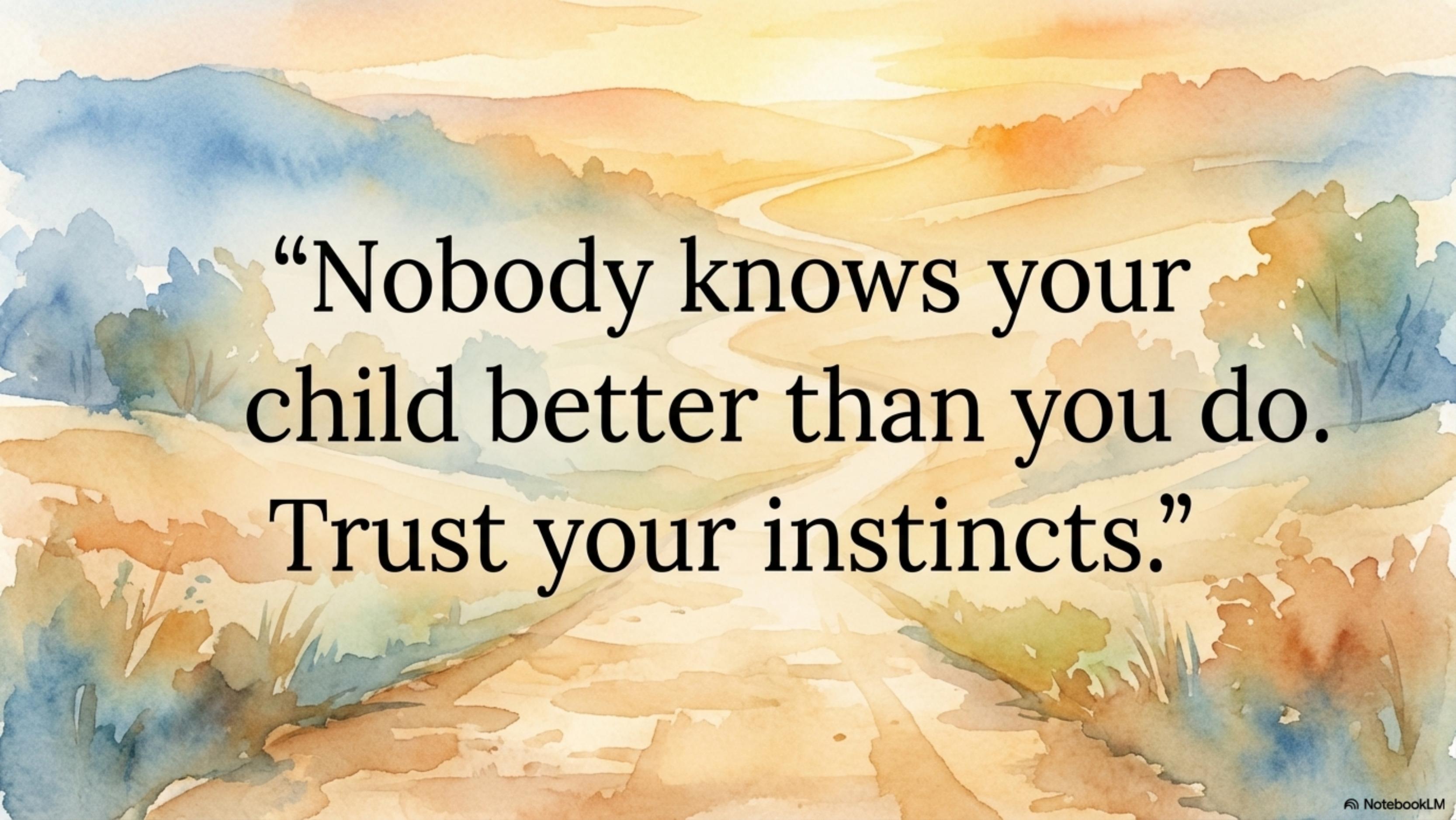
With intensive, early intervention, some children may experience partial recovery of lost skills.

You Are Not Walking This Path Alone

There is no cure for CDD, so a multidisciplinary treatment approach is essential to reduce symptoms and improve function. Key strategies include:

- **Behavioural Therapies:** Speech, occupational, and other therapies to enhance language, social, and daily living skills.
- **Medications:** May be used to control seizures or manage specific behaviours.



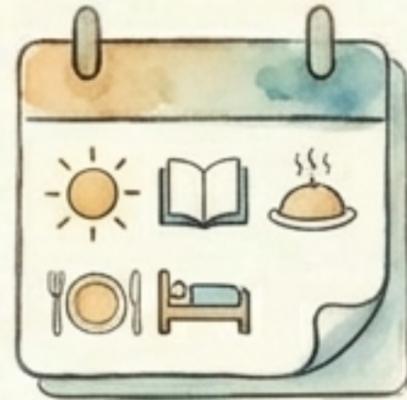

Creating a “CDD-Friendly” Home



Reduce Sensory Overload:
Use soft lighting, minimize loud noises, and create quiet spaces.



Establish Routine with Visuals: Use picture labels daily schedule charts to create predictability.



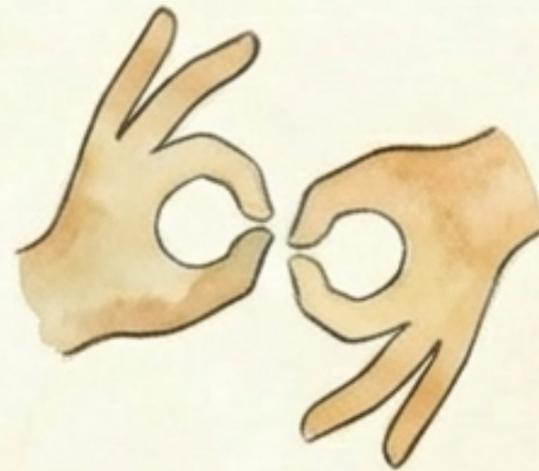
Designate a Safe Space:
Create a cozy corner where your child can retreat when feeling overwhelmed.

Finding Your Child's 'Language'

If verbal communication is challenging, explore and consistently use alternative methods. The goal is connection, not just words.

Celebrate the Small Wins

Did your child try a new food? Make eye contact? Use a new word? Every step forward is a victory.

Consider a “success board” to visually track these achievements and build momentum.

Build Your Own Support Network

You cannot pour from an empty cup. Caring for yourself is essential.

- **Connect with Peers:** Find other CDD parents in online or local support groups. You are not alone.
- **Prioritize Your Health:** Schedule regular 'me time.' See a therapist for your own mental health.





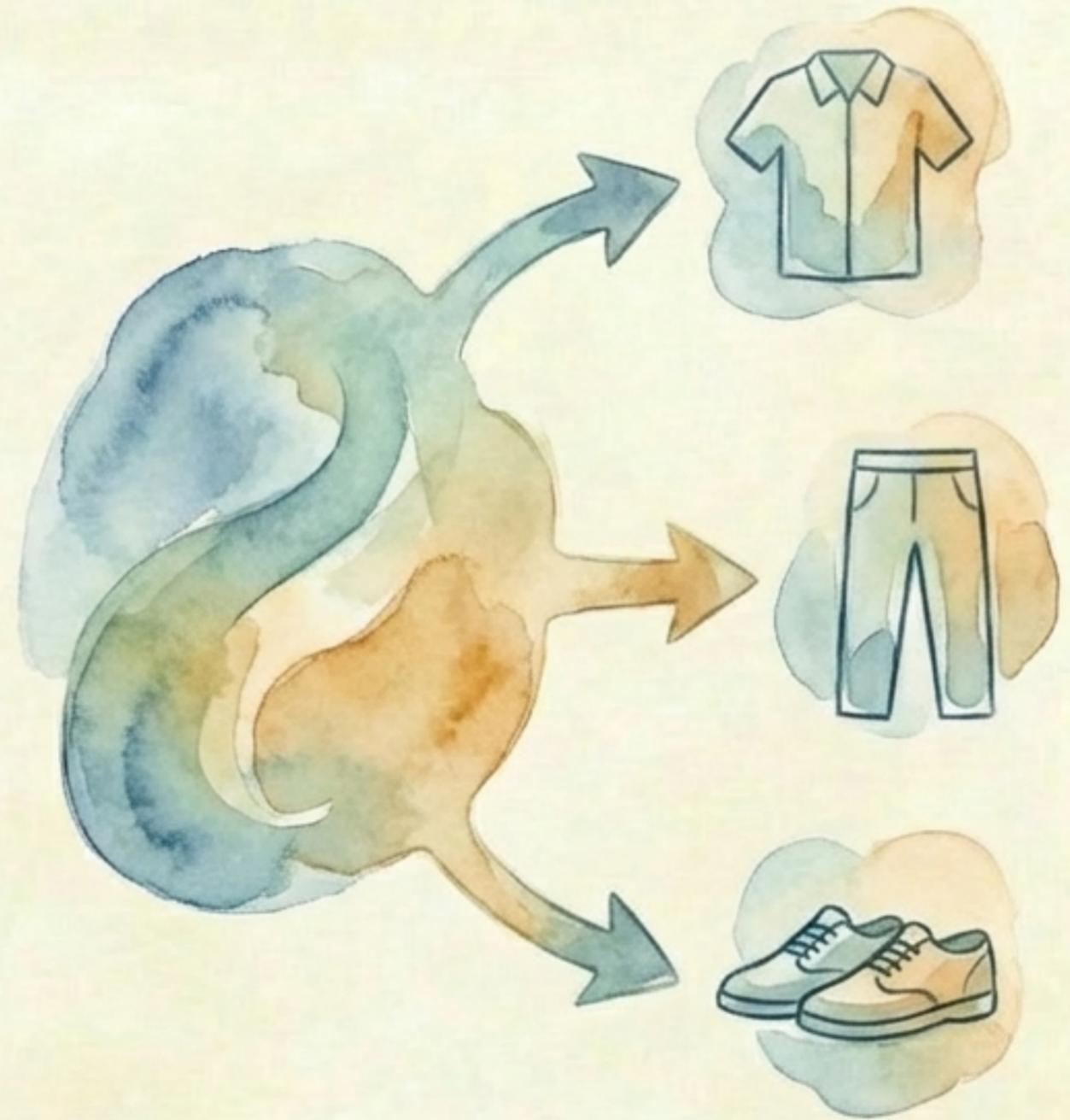
Becoming Your Child's Best Advocate

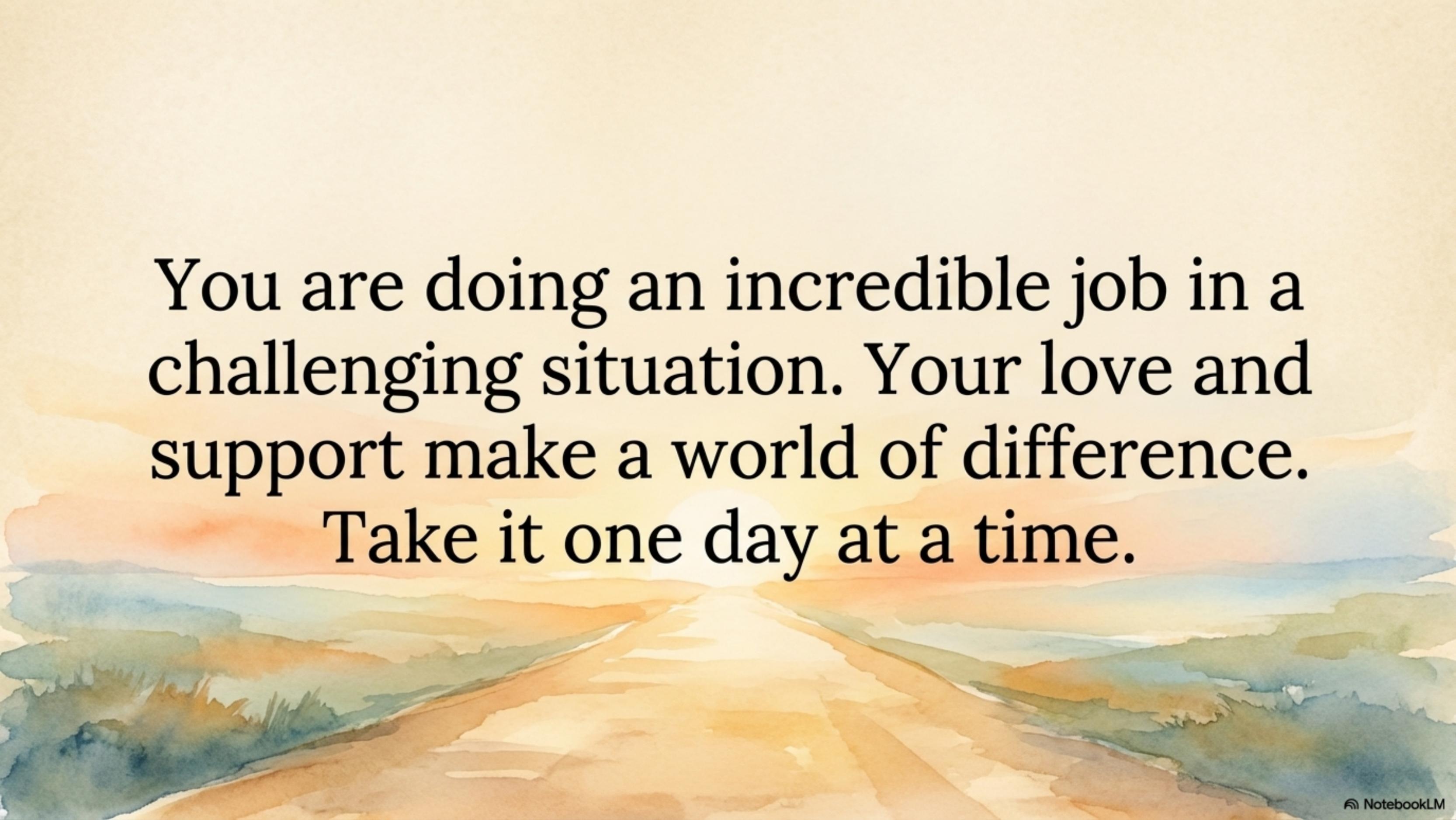
You are the most powerful voice for your child's needs.

1. **Organize:** Keep all medical and educational records in one accessible place.
2. **Prepare:** Before meetings, write down your main points and questions.
3. **Persist:** Don't be afraid to push for the services and support your child needs.

Fostering Independence, One Step at a Time

- **Break Down Tasks:** Divide activities like getting dressed into small, manageable steps.
- **Use Visual Guides:** Create picture-based instructions for daily routines.
- **Offer Choices:** Whenever possible, let your child make small choices to give them a sense of control.
